### Sept. 30 – National Day for Truth and Reconciliation

September 30, 2024, marked the fourth National Day for Truth and Reconciliation.

The day honours the children who never returned home and Survivors of residential schools, as well as their families and communities. Public commemoration of the tragic and painful history and ongoing impacts of residential schools is a vital component of the reconciliation process.

#### Wearing orange

Both the National Day for Truth and Reconciliation and Orange Shirt Day take place on September 30.

Orange Shirt Day is an Indigenous-led grassroots commemorative day intended to raise awareness of the individual, family and community intergenerational impacts of residential schools, and to promote the concept of "Every Child Matters". The orange shirt is a symbol of the stripping away of culture, freedom and selfesteem experienced by Indigenous children over generations.

Also, Canada developed an image to honour this day. Among the various visual elements illustrating Indigenous cultures, the circle is at the centre, which represents being together in spirit of reconciliation. The orange colour represents truth-telling and healing. The pathway represents the road to reconciliation. First Nations, Inuit and Métis are represented by the eagle, narwhal and beaded flower in the image. The stars represent the children who never made it home from residential schools.

## New Centre in Gitanmaax / Hazelton

In August a long-held vision for a Learning Centre in this community was realized. This was planned and undertaken in partnership with W2R Community Champion and Principal of Hazelton Secondary School Louise Ormerod. This vision for a community centred learning space was brought to her attention by the education leaders in Gitanmaax. Bob Blacker, Judy Blacker, the Library Response Team, Shirley-Pat Gale and school staff undertook the installation over the week of August 26th. Louise ensured the installation was grounded in the community, was the bridge to the school district that enabled the installation in a public school that will also be accessible to the community, and wove in the voices and needs of the students from the surrounding seven Gitxsan communities, educators, elders and knowledge keepers. This is a hybrid model and tailored to both the needs of the space and place it is situated. Funding support came largely from the National American Youth Exchange Network (NAYEN).
